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STAY COOL AND SAVE DURING SUMMER



Air conditioning can take the edge off a scorching day, but it can also driving up energy costs up when not used wisely. Here are some tips to keep your home safe and comfortable, and to prevent energy waste and keep utility costs low.

Be cool, not cold. Every degree you raise your thermostat, the less energy you use. Setting the AC at 78 degrees on hot summer days balances personal comfort and affordability.

Set your air conditioner to "auto" instead of "on."

That setting tells the AC unit to run only when the temperature goes above your preferred setting. "On" will make it run continuously and waste energy.

Remember the 20-degree rule. Lowering the thermostat doesn't necessarily make your home cool down quicker, but it does make your air conditioner work harder and drives up your electricity costs. Most AC units can only lower a home's interior to about 20 degrees cooler than the outdoor temperature. So, if it's 95 degrees outside and your thermostat is set to 70, your system might run all day and never reach it, but it'll keep costing you money.

Pre-cooling pays off. Cool your home for free by opening windows in the early mornings, evenings or overnight (if it's safe to do so) then shut them and the curtains before the temperatures rise. That will trap cool air inside. Pre-cooling with AC in the early afternoons before temperatures spike will have a similar effect.

Be a fan of fans. Ceiling and room fans can be just as effective at cooling you off as AC, but use a fraction of the power.

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MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR UTILITY ACCOUNT WITH MYACCOUNT




MyAccount is Clark Public Utilities' online customer service portal where you can access and manage all of your utility account information, anytime, from a computer or a smartphone.
